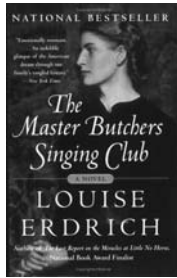

The John Newbery medal winner, *Kira-Kira* by Cynthia Kadohata, tells the story of a loving Japanese-

American family in the oppressive social climate of the South during the 1950s and early 1960s.

Kevin Henkes won the 2005 Caldecott Medal for illustration with *Kitten's First Full Moon*, a beautifully crafted book about a kitten that mistakes the moon for a bowl of milk.

Toni Morrison, author of *Remember: The Journey to School Integration*, and Kadir Nelson, illustrator of *Ellington Was Not a Street*, are the winners of the 2005 Coretta Scott King Awards honoring African American authors and illustrators of outstanding books for children and young adults.








