






Friday, January 14 4pm, Teen Space




Saturday, January 29 2-4pm, Auditorium

Topic: (Re-)Moving the Frontier: Iowa Statehood and the Long History of Native-European Interactions Presenter: Sebastian Braun, cultural anthropologist

Iowa became a state of the Union in 1846, on territories from which Native peoples had been removed through treaties. This presentation will look at the history of European and American interactions with American Indians in the area leading up to statehood. The very names of "Iowa" or "Des Moines" refer to Native nations.

We will explore some of their realities before and after statehood and discuss some of the legacies of that history for the present and future, with plenty of time for questions to follow the presentation.




