

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


Just the Facts

About **380 people signed up** for a Library card **each month**.





A Place for Literacy & Lifelong Learning

Library staff and volunteers made **755 deliveries** of books to 65 homebound citizens and 14 centers through **Home Delivery**.

The Library's **meeting and study rooms** were used for 9,188 programs, meetings, tutoring sessions, and more. That's over **25 uses per day**!

83 young people grades 6-12 spent the summer helping out at the Library contributing 2,040 hours through the APL-Youth Volunteer Program.

The Library helped combat childhood hunger by serving **477 meals** in 2015 as part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's **Summer Meals for Kids & Teens** program.

Books for Babies provided a board book and information packet to the family of each baby born at Mary Greeley Medical Center.



8,723 people attended the Library's **421 programs for adults**.

1,971 teens attended **100 Library** events designed for 6th-12th graders.

26,630 people attended 771 storytimes and programs for children and families.

2,257 children, 318 teens, and 409 adults participated in the 2015 Summer Reading Program.

Project Smyles took books and storytimes to children to over 1,400 children in daycares and preschools every month through **972 visits and 44 Library tours**.

Small Talk Story County helped **26 families** create an enriching language environment for their babies by providing information, personalized training, and a "talk pedometer" for parents to measure their progress.

A Hub of Community Connections

The Bookmobile celebrated 50 years of service in 2015! The current Bookmobile is the 4th vehicle to provide mobile branch service throughout the community.

Ames Public Library's Bookmobile makes several weekly stops throughout Ames. In 2015/2016, **9,332 customers** visited a **neighborhood stop**!

The Bookmobile also visited a variety of **community events**, such as Farmers' Markets and the annual EcoFair, welcoming **1,945 people** aboard.



Creating Connections

Library staff strive to create an environment that encourages people to connect to one another. Programs such as Conversations brought community members together to speak their native language or practice a new one, while participants in parenting groups shared experiences and advice.



Community Partners

Partnerships with community organizations and City departments helped Library staff create a rich and diverse lineup of events for the community, from Step Into Storybooks to local history lectures to jobfinding workshops.

lowa State University students, faculty, and classes worked with the Library to share knowledge and skills through programs, class projects, and internships.



A Center for Information Access

Ames Public Library offers technology and digital resources for many purposes, including bridging the digital divide, helping individuals of all ages gain skills needed in our digital world, and connecting our community with the many resources available online.

Computers for the public were used over **128 times per day** in 2015/2016.

The Library's **10 iPads** were checked out an average of **188 times per month**.


The **4 early literacy computers** were used over **4,750 times each** last year.

Ames Public Library offered card holders free access to **36 subscription online resources**, which were used a total of **103,878 times** in 2015/2016.


- EBSCO Host was used 22,209 times.

Library staff and community partners shared their technology expertise through computer classes, iPhone & iPad Training, Tech Talk, Workforce Readiness Training, Coding for Kids, and more.

Use of Ames Public Library's downloadable e-books, e-audiobooks, and e-magazines continued to increase steadily.




A Heart of Discovery & Creativity



The children's area of the Library is packed with exciting ways for young people to discover their world and get creative. Options range from puppets and musical instruments to educational computer games, Legos, and the new Keva planks. Libraries offer opportunities to discover a new favorite book, explore a hobby, and experience arts and culture—without an admission fee.

In 2015/2016, Ames Public Library offered over **300,000 items**, from bestselling e-books to children's puzzles to GRE study guides.

Library users explored their own creativity at a variety of Library programs and events, including CRAFTERday, Coloring Book Club, Inkspots, Poetry Jam, and more.
